Attend and Achieve

The proud winners of the cup for autumn term 2 were **Foxes Class** with an attendance of **94.02%**. The other classes' attendance levels are:

- Badgers with 92.46%
- Rabbits with 91.02%
- Voles with 89.1%
- Owls with 87.79%
- Hedgehogs with 86.65%
- Squirrels with 85.9%.

The overall attendance for the whole school was 89.64% and the DfE target is over 95%. We are aware that all classes were hit

The school is still working tirelessly to bridge the gaps in the children's learning, especially as there has been major disruption to their education in the last few years due to Covid. Good attendance is key for us to be able to achieve this and we value your support.

Nursery would be grateful for donations of good quality umbrella style child's play buggies, if you have one that is no longer played with. Please leave it at the school office.




School Learning

Squirrels Class began a new Literacy unit, based on the story 'A Little Stuck' by Oliver Jeffers. The character got his kite stuck in a tree and couldn't get



it down. This prompted a discussion about



trees and natural materials. The children were interested in tree

bark, sticks and stones.



Squirrels went on a walk around the school environment to collect

natural materials. Then in art these were used to create a picture or pattern. They loved creating people, faces and monsters using the things they had gathered. They also really enjoyed looking at 'pebble people' pictures online and talked about what the pebbles represented.

In Year 1, Hedgehogs and Rabbits have been inspired to create their own art in the style of Jasper Johns, a well-known American abstract artist. They all enjoyed layering numbers on top of one another and then carefully filling in the



white spaces with brightly coloured paint.

Year 2 have welcomed the children back after the Christmas break, where they have quickly settled back and are engaged in their learning. They



have been learning about what life was like for children living in Victorian times, comparing their lives with the lives of children today. The children have particularly enjoyed the opportunity to experience Victorian toys and

other equipment used at that time. Badgers and Foxes have impressed us all with their fantastic sketches of puppets. They



are looking forward to making their own puppets later in the half term.



'50 things to do before you are five' app

We are keen to let you know about a free Hertfordshire App, '50 Things To Do Before You're Five', an exciting initiative that supports children's learning at home and in their early years setting.



The App has a menu of activities for families with young children, giving great suggestions for how to have fun and learn at the same time.

The "50 Things" App is free to download here or through the AppStore or GooglePlay store, and then select Hertfordshire from the list of regions/cities. Once downloaded, the App offers a list of 50 free or low-cost activities (under £20 for a family of four) that parents can experience with their child/children in or around Hertfordshire. This no-cost resource can be used to complement the EYFS curriculum and home learning.

if a person or animal




is no longer around, that love for them will always be there. Mrs Huke loves this book and its message that no one is ever alone.

Maths mastery for all!

When learning mathematics at Swing Gate School, the children develop a conceptual understanding through the Concrete, Pictorial and Abstract (CPA) approach where children

handle physical resources, use pictorial representations and record using traditional abstract numbers and symbols. To help you understand this approach, we will explore some of the key pieces of equipment and representations that we use at school. This week, we are looking at number lines.

Number Lines



Number lines can be used from the Foundation Stage, where children learn to recognise and order numbers. They may be given a blank number line and asked to put numbers on it. In Key Stage One, number lines can be used to calculate. For example a child might be asked to solve 7 + 2 = ?, where they would mark 7 on the number line and then count on two until they get to 9.

Number lines can also be used to solve multiplication and division questions by jumping along the number line in repeated steps. To solve $5 \times 4 = ?$, a child could jump along a number line in 4s five times until they reach the number 20.

At home, number lines can be drawn on the ground using chalk or on paper. You can also search for different types of number lines, for example when looking at house numbers or at the divisions on measuring tapes and weighing scales. Playing board games like snakes and ladders are also a good early introduction to the concept of moving forwards and backwards on a number line.

Online relationships

A fact that may surprise you is 26% of 6-year olds use the web for social media. (Opinion Leader, 2016).



Five to seven year olds online relationships are likely to be with people that the child knows in real life and will be managed by their parents or teachers. Model polite online behaviour and relate this to the way they behave when face-to-face with someone.

Ensure that children are clear about what to do if they are upset by something online, including someone trying to make them do something wrong.

Reinforce that your child should never have feelings of guilt or embarrassment if they have come unstuck online. Speaking about mistakes or inappropriate interactions is essential.

Wellbeing in Action

Healthy Eating Sausage sandwich with pesto Ingredients



- 2 herby Cumberland sausages, sliced in half lengthways
- 1 ciabatta roll, sliced in half
- 2 tbsp fresh pesto
- 1 roasted red pepper from a jar, sliced in half
- ½ x 125g ball mozzarella, sliced
- handful rocket.

Method

- Heat grill to high. Put the sausages on a baking sheet, cut-side down, and grill for 5-6 mins or until cooked through, then set aside.
- Lay the ciabatta roll halves, cut-side up, on a baking tray and spread each with pesto. Top each half with a pepper and mozzarella slice, then grill for 2 mins or until golden and bubbling.
- 3. Add the sausages and a handful of rocket, and put the roll back together, pressing down firmly to hold the fillings in place.



Mindfulness

Try the 'squish and relax' technique

Children have a natural tendency to tense up in a crisis. This exercise helps children to lower their stress levels and relax. Initially, give the child something that will actually 'squish' in their hands, such as play dough, a stress ball or a sponge. Later on, encourage them to use the exercise without these props.

How to squish and relax:

- Make sure your child is sitting comfortably with the squish object in one hand.
- Ask them to take several deep belly breaths.
- Tell them to squeeze the object tightly like they are trying to pick up a heavy weight. Have them hold this pose for a count of five, then relax.
- Repeat the cycle for a minute or two. Then allow your child to rest for two deep belly breaths.
- Repeat with the other hand.

Discuss with your child how their bodies felt during and after the activity. What did they notice? How could this help them when they are angry, upset or anxious?
